Abstract: H. Wiley Hitchcock, an American musicologist, was influential in

advancing the study of American music in the United States. He was a noted scholar of Charles Ives and Henry Cowell, and the founder and longtime director of the Institute for the Studies of American Music (ISAM) at Brooklyn College, City University of New York. His papers document his research, writings and other scholarly activity, and the work done by ISAM during his tenure as director (1971-

1993).

Biographical note

H. Wiley Hitchcock was an American musicologist who did much to advance the study of American music in the United States. Born in Detroit in 1923, he received his BA from Dartmouth College in 1944 and his MM from the University of Michigan in 1948, after which he studied with Nadia Boulanger in Paris. He returned to Michigan, where he completed his PhD in 1954 and began his teaching career. In the early 1960s he moved to New York, where he was professor of music at Hunter College, CUNY from 1961-1971.

In 1971 he moved to Brooklyn College, CUNY, where he became professor of music and founder-director of the Institute for Studies in American Music; in 1980 he was named Distinguished Professor. He retired in 1993. He was among the first group of Getty scholars at the J. Paul Getty Center for Art History and the Humanities (1985-6). In 1994 he was made an honorary member of the AMS, and in 1995 Chevalier of the Ordre des Arts et des Lettres.

Hitchcock made significant contributions to the study of 17th-century French and Italian music and music in the United States. His research on the vocal and instrumental music of Marc-Antoine Charpentier led to editions of the music as well as the preparation of a catalogue raisonné, *Les oeuvres de Marc-Antoine Charpentier* (1982), and the book *Marc-Antoine Charpentier* (1990). His edition of Giulio Caccini's *Le nuove musiche* (1970) includes a detailed study and an annotated translation of the original preface.

Among his publications on American music are a study of Ives (1977) and an important survey, *Music in the United States* (1969), in which he develops the idea of a distinction between vernacular and cultivated traditions in American music, particularly in the period from 1820 to 1920. He was president of the Music Library Association (1966-7), of the Charles Ives Society (1973-93) and of the American Musicological Society (1990-92). He acted as adviser on American music for the sixth edition of *The New Grove Dictionary of Music and Musicians* and was co-editor of *The New Grove Dictionary of American Music*; he was also editor of the series *Recent Researches in American Music* (1976-94).

Hitchcock died in New York in 2007.

Scope and content note

Hitchcock's papers are roughly split between his research and writings and the activities of the Institute for Studies in American Music (ISAM). They consist of correspondence, writings, memos, research notes, manuscripts, teaching materials, and sound recordings. His professional files document his research and editorial work in musicology, particularly his work on Charles Ives and Henry Cowell, and in editing *The New Grove Dictionary of American Music*; they also reveal his work as a lecturer, critic, writer and educator, both within academia and for the general public.

The ISAM files document the history and activities of that organization, particularly its publications, but also its production of concerts, meetings, symposia, and colloquia on behalf of American music and musicians. Many of ISAM's efforts during Hitchcock's tenure as director focused on Charles Ives, for whom the Institute hosted the first Festival and Conference in 1974, and Henry Cowell. Hitchcock was designated by Cowell's widow, Sidney Robertson Cowell, as the arbiter of the Cowell Collection at The New York Public Library, and both his professional and ISAM files contain discussion of that collection.

Series I. Professional Files, 1949-2007

Hitchcock's professional files consist of correspondence, writing and editing files, research papers, files documenting special projects and activities with organizations, and sound recordings. Correspondence is found throughout the series, but letters found in series I.A tend to be more general or personal than the letters associated with other files. The writing and editing files, consisting of papers related to Hitchcock's articles, notes, lectures, criticism and editing work, comprise about half the series, due mostly to the extensive documentation of Hitchcock's editorship of *The New Grove Dictionary of American Music*. Much of Hitchcock's later career was occupied with Charles Ives and Henry Cowell, and research and editing work on those composers comprise most of the research papers.

Hitchcock's correspondence contains an alphabetical file, a chronological file he maintained, and a file of requests for his services (also arranged chronologically). There is also a folder of letters of recommendation Hitchcock wrote. Correspondents include musicologists, theorists, musicians, composers and writers, such as Carole Farley, Charles Garrett, Malcolm Goldstein, Daniel Lentz, Carol Oja, Steve Reich, Mark Tucker, Richard Crawford, Roger Reynolds, Kyle Gann, John Kirkpatrick and many others.

I.B. Writings, 1949-1961, 1969, 1971, 1973-2007 3.5 boxes

This sub-series documents Hitchcock's work as a writer, which consisted of articles, books, criticism, lectures and recording liner notes. These files contain manuscripts, typed and printed drafts, notes, correspondence, lecture texts, and clippings.

There are only three article files, two of which, *The Alderdice Ms. in the Clements Library: A Preliminary Report* and *The Music Performed on the Occasion of the Gettysburg Address*, contain manuscripts as well as correspondence.

One of Hitchcock's books, *Music In The United States: A Historical Introduction, Third Edition*, is documented by files which contain notes and correspondence related to each chapter, but not manuscripts, unless otherwise noted. (Files on another book, *Critical Commentaries for Charles Ives 129 Songs*, are in research files in series I.D.) The book *A Celebration of American Music*, a compendium of Hitchcock's writings, was compiled and edited by others.

Most of Hitchcock's published criticism dates from his stint as a newspaper music critic in Ann Arbor, Michigan, from 1949-1961. The files contain newspaper clippings and some correspondence in reaction to his reviews.

In addition to his lectures to students, Hitchcock often spoke publicly on musical topics at meetings, symposia, concerts and other public events. Topics include Ives, Cowell, Aaron Copland, Oscar Sonneck and more general subjects such as minimalism and early American music. Some lecture files contain full texts while others contain only written notes Hitchcock spoke from. The collection also contains audio recordings of six Hitchcock lectures.

I.C. Editing, 1973-1996

This sub-series documents Hitchcock's work as an editor of reference sources and books.

The bulk is composed of papers relating to Hitchcock's co-editorship of *The New Grove Dictionary of American Music* (usually referred to in the papers by its nickname, Amerigrove). The background and correspondence files mainly contain correspondence and memos between Hitchcock, his co-editor Stanley Sadie, their assistant Susan Feder, and Macmillan Press; editorial files contain correspondence between Hitchcock and the many contributors to the dictionary, as well as article proofs, notes, indexes, and publicity and promotional material. The editorial correspondence files are arranged by a subject scheme employed by Hitchcock, Sadie and Feder. A guide to this arrangement scheme can be found in Susan Feder correspondence, box 8, folder 5. Folder titles contain the subjects. Editors for each subject are identified in notes, when known.

Other editorial projects covered in the series are the *Earlier American Music* series for Da Capo Press and Sidney Robertson Cowell's *A Chapbook Of Cheer*. (Note: See Series II.B for files on Hitchcock's editorial work on the ISAM monograph series and the *Recent Researches In American Music* series.)

I.D. Research Files, 1961, 1968, 1973-2007

11.5 boxes

This sub-series primarily contains Hitchcock's research and notes on the work of Charles Ives and Henry Cowell. Other topics of research include Aaron Copland and Minimalism.

In addition to serving as co-founder and longtime president of the Charles Ives Society, Hitchcock edited an edition of Ives's *Three Harvest Home Chronicles* and published the book *Critical Commentaries for Charles Ives 129 Songs*. The papers contain Hitchcock's research and notes for both, and a small set of Ives scores containing his annotations. The files for the Ives 129 songs commentaries contain Hitchcock's printed notes on 84 of the songs; some also contain annotated scores. All are undated unless otherwise noted. In addition, the Ives papers include subject files containing research notes and correspondence, mostly on various Ives compositions, but also on topics such as Harmony Ives and Ives's publisher, Herman Langinger.

Henry Cowell's widow, Sidney Robertson Cowell, assigned Hitchcock to be the arbiter for the Cowell estate and for the Cowell Collection that was donated to Music Division of the New York Public Library for the Performing Arts (during the 1970s it was on deposit at the library, but not yet owned by it). Hitchcock's Cowell papers include articles about and analysis of Cowell's work, files concerning the Cowell Collection, a small set of biographical source material and correspondence with Sidney Robertson Cowell.

Hitchcock's Cowell papers also include a set of unpublished Cowell songs that were originally going to be published by Peter Garland's *Soundings* press in the early 1990s. The project, which Hitchcock was assisting in the capacity of editor, never came to fruition. The papers here include clear copyist versions of the songs and correspondence with Garland and Sidney Cowell about the project. They also include correspondence with the mezzo-soprano Wendy Hillhouse about the Cowell songs, unrelated to the Garland publishing project. (Note: Series II contains other Ives and Cowell papers pertaining to the activities of ISAM.)

The research files also contain sound recordings Hitchcock collected, some unique. These include music by George Chadwick, Roger Reynolds and Arthur Foote, radio interviews with Aaron Copland and Richard Rodgers, and 60 tapes of performances conducted by Richard Korn.

These papers contain files on Hitchcock's activities and projects, some of them in conjunction with organizations, primarily the American Musicological Society (AMS) and the Society for American Music (originally called the Sonneck Society). The AMS papers mainly document Hitchcock's work with the Society's Committee for the Publication of American Music (COPAM) and his editing of an edition of Virgil Thomson's *Four Saints In Three Acts* published by AMS. Other projects or organizations represented in this sub-series are the American Composers Orchestra (for whom Hitchcock wrote program notes), the Organization of American Historians and the Smithsonian Institution.

Teaching materials, such as course and seminar syllabi for classes taught at Brooklyn College, are also present in these papers. Courses include *Composers and Controversy: Activism in American Music*, a seminar on Ives and Cowell, and *Music in American Popular Culture*.

Series II: ISAM Records, 1960-2002 and undated 39 boxes

Hitchcock's ISAM files document the activities of the Institute during his tenure as director. They are in two sub-series, General Administration and Publications.

General Administration files document the regular activities of ISAM as a research facility and as an academic entity within Brooklyn College. Its research work included an oral history project on Henry Cowell and the first conference on Charles Ives in 1974, as well as many other meetings and symposia. Other files document ISAM's recruitment of research fellows and visiting lecturers, its annual reports, and its development and fundraising activities. These papers include correspondence, memos, publicity materials and photographs. The collection also contains sound recordings of events produced by ISAM.

The Publication files document the Institute's publishing ventures. These include the ISAM monograph series, the *ISAM Newsletter*, and the *Recent Researches In American Music* series, as well as special publications.

II.A. General Administration, 1960-2002 and undated 17 boxes

These files contain correspondence, memos and photographs documenting the research and public presentations undertaken by ISAM, as well as the Institute's routine activities.

The Institute reflected Hitchcock's own interests and therefore did much work in Charles Ives and Henry Cowell studies. It organized and hosted the first Ives Festival and Conference in 1974 and hosted symposia and colloquia regarding both composers, documented by correspondence and promotional material. The collection contains sound recordings of some of these events, including the 1974 Ives Festival and Conference, a 1977 conference on *The Phonograph And Our Musical Life*, a 1977 Henry Cowell retrospective concert, and various other lectures, colloquia and concerts.

The Institute carried out an oral history project on Cowell, and transcripts of these interviews are present, as is correspondence with Sidney Robertson Cowell regarding them. In the 1970s the Institute attempted to organize the Cowell Collection then on deposit at the Music Division of the New York Public Library for the Performing Arts, an effort documented by correspondence and a grant application. (Also see series II.B. for papers on ISAM's monographs series, which included several Cowell-related publications.)

A frequent correspondent of Hitchcock and ISAM was Peter Garland, the founder/editor of Soundings press. In addition to Garland/ISAM correspondence, the series contains a folder of reproductions of correspondence between Garland and the composer Conlon Nancarrow over the course of at least 17 years. (See series I.D. for more correspondence with Garland regarding the Henry Cowell unpublished songs project.)

Other portions of series II.A. include correspondence with visiting lecturers, research fellows and research assistants, as well as candidates for all these positions who never came to ISAM due to funding, scheduling or other reasons. Some of the correspondence in the papers is from staff at ISAM other than Hitchcock, such as research assistant Rita Mead or Carol Oja, who became Director following Hitchcock's retirement. There are also papers, correspondence and photographs documenting the history and organization of the Institute, as well as correspondence between the Institute, the Brooklyn College Conservatory of Music, and other units of CUNY.
